II. General Information and Status Updates

A. Mayor Vera Calvin Plaza in Old Town Weekly Update

Construction of the Mayor Vera Calvin Plaza is on schedule.

Project Highlights:

- Steel erected at shade pavilions

Construction activity for next week, September 16 - 20, will include:

- Pour stage platform grab beams – plinths (scheduled 9/17)
- Continue work for site foundations
- Continue electric branch/site circuits
- Continue with shade pavilion steel”

Look ahead:

- Trolley cars on schedule to be re-set on 9/27



B. Parks Master Plan Youth Outreach

On June 17, 2019, City Council received a report on the proposed Parks, Trails, and Recreation Master Plan. Council expressed a desire to provide additional opportunities for youth input on the plan. Staff developed a revised survey and will begin collecting surveys from the youth of Burleson beginning Monday, September 16, 2019. A link to the survey is provided below. Staff also created graphics for social media distribution and will be conducting a drawing from completed surveys to give away five \$25.00 gift cards. Staff connected with BISD and plans to send the link to all principals for distribution to students and will visit three elementary schools, conduct surveys with the PE classes, and visit all three Middle Schools and both High Schools during the lunch periods to collect surveys. Staff has reached out to JISD and is currently waiting for their response to assist in distributing the survey to their schools located within the Burleson city limits. We will use our contacts and resources to ensure the survey is distributed to Burleson homeschool families, as well. Staff will utilize social media, city email distribution lists, and promote the survey at story times and other youth programs. Staff initially conducted a Youth Focus Group for the Parks, Trails, and Recreation Master Plan on October 4, 2018. Another focus group was held on October 8, 2018 that included youth sports organizations. However, staff recognizes that we missed capturing demographic data on youth under 18 during the initial community survey. Ideas and feedback generated from the youth survey will be included in the Parks, Trails, and Recreation Master Plan, and the results will be presented in a Friday report after the survey is completed. Our goal is to collect all youth feedback by October 11, 2019

C. Old Town ‘Git Up’ Video

Old Town Burleson Facebook page published their ‘Old Town Git Up’ parody video last week and it is quite a success. The brainchild of Old Town Administrator Joni Van Noy, features several local Old Town businesses dancing to the very popular song, “The Git Up” by Blanco Brown. Collin Gregory, communications coordinator, created the video which has now been viewed 275,000 views, reached over 659,000 people, been shared over 1,900 times, had over 2,600 reaction and 287 comments. D. Shannon Creek Apartments (Gold Creek Homes)

A Planned Development (PD) Ordinance for apartments, single family homes, cottages and retail uses was approved on December 10, 2018. Included in the ordinance was the statement, “prior to issuance of any building permits, a site plan shall be submitted for any building located on Tracts 1, 2, and 3 and the City Council shall review and approve the architectural design. The architectural design shall be similar in color and architectural design throughout the mixed use development.”

A site plan was submitted by the applicant and considered by the Planning and Zoning Commission on March 5, 2019 and recommended for approval. Between the P&Z and Council meetings, the applicant became concerned that Council would not approve the submittal based on the architectural compatibility statement and requested to table the item in order to modify the architecture. Below is an image of the original submittal and the revised submittal. These elevations and minor revisions to the site plan are scheduled for consideration by P&Z on September 17 and Council on October 7. Modifications include more brick, the use of Hardie board instead of stucco and addition of craftsman elements. Staff believes that these modifications are more in harmony with the single family component of the development. The materials do not meet the masonry standards within the PD ordinance, but with the newly adopted legislation

DWI Arrests and Impaired Driver Accidents are subcategories of the overall arrests and accidents. These numbers were included in the data tables above. DWI Arrests are only On-View (not DWI warrants). Impaired Driver Accidents are those with causation factors: 45 (Had Been Drinking), 62 (Taking Medication), 67 (Under Influence - Alcohol), 68 (Under Influence - Drug).

Hidden Vista Retaining Wall

The contractor has completed installing the drain below the flume and is currently grading the slope. Work began on the slope to excavate soil at the point of failure approximately four to five feet below the top of the bottom retaining wall and will extend fully to the broken edge of the wall to ensure the re-built slope will not settle.

The excavated spoils are drying out quickly and will be processed to ensure it has uniform moisture content enabling the re-use of the soil as fill. The engineer has visited the site several times to oversee this work and has stated that no dry, crumbling soil with hard clods or wet soft soil should be used without process properly. The soil will be molded and compacted without signs of pumping or rolling which tend to show evidence of too much moisture remaining.

During the engineer's site visit, it was noted that a leak in the irrigation lines was present and recommended repair to avoid excess moisture from entering the area.
