B. BTX CORE SHOUT OUTS:**Officer Denbow and Sgt. Price | Burleson Police Department****Core values: Empathy, Trust, Excellence**

During the winter weather event on Monday, Jan. 26, Officer Denbow and Sgt. Price exemplified the very best of BTX CORE values through compassion and service beyond the call of duty.

Public Safety Communications Supervisor Erica Roberts was iced in at home with her 6-year-old daughter while recovering from an illness. When she began feeling worse and developed a fever, her doctor advised her to seek immediate medical attention. With road conditions unsafe for travel, Roberts contacted Sgt. Price.

Sgt. Price and Officer Denbow quickly coordinated transportation to ensure Roberts could safely reach the hospital. Officer Denbow also helped ensure a nearby friend was able to safely reach Roberts' home to care for her daughter. He offered additional assistance if anything else was needed.

This act of kindness and professionalism reflects true empathy, trust and excellence. It serves as a powerful reminder that the Burleson team is more than coworkers, it is a family that shows up for one another when it matters most.

PSC TEAM DEMONSTRATES DEDICATION DURING WINTER STORM RESPONSE

Burleson's Public Safety Communications (PSC) team was hard at work responding to emergencies, coordinating vital public safety resources, and ensuring that residents in need got help when they needed it most.

Over the course of the storm response, the PSC team answered 69 Fire/EMS calls and approximately 194 Police calls for service, ranging from medical emergencies and weather-related crashes to stranded motorists and welfare checks. Additionally, they supported 147 self-initiated calls from officers conducting close patrols and business checks to keep the community safe.



This level of performance doesn't happen without commitment and flexibility. **Ashley Hughes** stepped up to work on her scheduled day off after her original plans were canceled due to the weather. **Presley Lyons** also responded to a callout on her day off, helping to cover shifts and keep operations running smoothly.

C. WINTER WEATHER EVENT STAFF RECOGNITION

Winter weather events do not impact just one department, they impact the entire organization. While many city facilities and non-essential operations were closed to the public, city services continued because employees across multiple departments stepped up to keep Burleson running.

From Public Works street crews treating roadways and Water teams responding to emergencies, to Public Safety Dispatch, Police and Fire/EMS supporting life safety needs, this event required coordination, long hours and flexibility from staff throughout the city. Communications, IT, HR, Finance, Utility Customer Service and many other teams also worked behind the scenes to ensure operations continued and residents received timely information and support.




F. BURLESON SENIOR ACTIVITY CENTER PROGRAMMING











Are You Prepared For Winter Weather?

In 2021, Winter Storm Uri reminded us that no part of the state is off-limits when it comes to severe winter weather and freeze damage. From the Panhandle to the coast and everywhere in between, nearly every governmental entity has a story related to that storm. Widespread system failures underscored how quickly conditions can overwhelm communities when equipment, facilities, and emergency plans aren't prepared or do not account for challenges associated with the event. Local government crews are often the first to respond, so staying on top of maintenance, supplies, and communication plans is critical to keeping employees and the community safe when temperatures drop, ice begins to form, or winter precipitation falls from the sky.

1

Equipment Maintenance. Generators, HVAC units, vehicles, and powered equipment need to be inspected and tested well before cold weather arrives. Perform routine checks such as monthly generator runs, annual HVAC inspections, daily fleet checks, and regular inspections of sprinkler systems..

Building Maintenance. Make sure staff know where water shut-off valves are located and how to use them in case of a burst pipe. Prevent frozen pipes by insulating exposed lines and using heaters or heat tracing in vulnerable areas. Don't forget to secure and monitor vacant buildings, which are often the first to suffer damage.

Emergency Supplies. Stock up on essentials like potable water, diesel for generators, flashlights, and appropriate winter PPE. Vehicles should carry ice scrapers, blankets, traction materials like ice melt or sand, and a phone charger. These supplies help keep crews stay mobile and allow critical services to continue even during extended outages or road impacts.

Emergency Contacts. Update your roster of essential employees and clarify who responds on weekends or after hours. Maintain current contact information for utility providers, remediation contractors, and state emergency management partners. Quick communication reduces delays and helps coordinate a faster response when conditions start to deteriorate. (see SynergyNDS below)

Community Consideration. Identify and confirm warming center locations, and communicate them clearly to the public. Use social media, automated messaging systems, and local news outlets to push timely updates on closures, hazards, and available assistance. Strong communication helps make safe choices and reduces strain on emergency services.
